A Pilgrim's Progress

Can any sense be made of Easter in a Good Friday world? By all appearances, it is indeed a Good Friday world. Easter says that defeat is not the last word. Death is not the last word. The message of Easter states that we are willing to follow the way set out by Jesus. We do not proclaim that we are raised to wait for the hereafter. We do not proclaim that we are finished with the journey. We do not proclaim that there is nothing left for us to do. Rather we claim that what happened to Jesus will happen to us. We are raised to walk, right here, right now, in newness of life. (Kenneth R. Lyle, Jr. "Preaching the Resurrection to Experience the Risen Christ," The Living Pulpit, April-June 2005, p. 14)

It's necessary to emphasize that Easter has less to do with one person's escape from the grave than with the victory of seemingly powerless love over loveless power. Too often Easter comes across very sentimentally, like dessert water—airy and sweet. But there's nothing sentimental about Easter. Easter represents a demand as well as a promise, a demand not that we sympathize with the crucified Christ, but that we pledge our loyalty to the risen one. That means an end to all loyalties, to all people and all institutions that crucify.

Easter becomes an opportunity to roll the stones away from our graves. Easter becomes the experience of the courage to confront death and to believe that life is eternal. Easter becomes the assurance that God is present in our times of limits and loss. God's love reaches into and beyond the tomb. Easter begins by rolling away the stone that keeps us more dead than alive.

From this perspective Easter is not the triumph over the idea of death; it is the discovery of life in the midst of the experience of death. It is the experience that God's presence makes a difference in how we live our lives and deal with our losses. With death being present in so much of our experience, the promise of God's presence is power, power that helps us to develop both courage and action.

Easter proclaims that forgiveness is offered to all of us exactly as it was to Peter. All the rulers of the world are forgiven and church people, too. All are forgiven; which means that if we appropriate our forgiveness, we are relieved not of the consequences of our sin, but of the consequences of our being sinners. Now we are forgiven sinners; which means that with the zeal of gratitude we can become 10 times the people we are. It means that instead of trying to prove ourselves endlessly, we can express ourselves as fearless, vulnerable, dedicated, joyous followers of the Risen Christ. May God help all of us to be Easter people in a Good Friday world.

As communities across the U.S. celebrate Earth Day on April 22, we can look back in history and discover yet another UCC first. Twenty years ago, on the eve of Earth Day 1987, the United Church of Christ's Commission for Racial Justice published a landmark report, "Toxic Waste and Race." For the first time in history, the disproportionate burden borne by African American, Latino, Native American, and Asian American communities as the "dumping grounds" for our nation's waste and pollution was documented. Funded by Our Church's Wider Mission, the study looked at every zip code in the United States and identified where toxic waste sites were located. It found that race was themost significant factor, even more significant than poverty. "Toxic Waste and Race" led to the coining of the term "environmental racism" and helped to jump start the environmental justice movement.
