

GREETINGS

I thought that you might be interested in some of my remarks made at the GCC Leadership Retreat on August 25, 2012, in the thirteenth month of my serving GCC as its Transitional Senior Minister.

I give heartfelt thanks to everyone who has made my period of serving you transparent, productive and joyful. Most especially to:

- Pam, not only for being a wonderful partner in ministry, but also for greatly improving the efficiency of many of our church's operations.
- Gary, for maintaining an excellent music program during the year-long search for a new Director of Adult Choirs.
- Marilyn, for being our outstanding parish nurse (faith community nurse) for over 25 years, and recently taking on the responsibility of revitalizing and coordinating GCC's Called to Care Ministry.
- Elizabeth, for developing and maintaining a clear understanding of her work with our youth and their parents, and for granting me the privilege of being her mentor in a year-long field-experience course in her Master of Divinity program at Chicago Theological Seminary.
- Bill Dailey, for being a willing and thoughtful listener, and a careful decision maker.

In my presentation at the leadership retreat last year, I spoke of sincere and open interaction between clergy and laity being vital to the health and growth of a church. During my first five months with you, I gained an appreciation of the characteristics of interaction with former called ministers. The numerous interviews that I initially had with congregants pointed not only to significant

recent issues that had generated conflict, but to a willingness to use the transitional period for reconciliation with the past in preparation for a new Senior Minister to guide GCC into a spiritually and economically healthy future.

Also in my presentation, I talked about the "five R's" that would engage our self-study during the transitional period.

- Remembering coming to terms with history. Examples are the individual meetings that I have had with congregants, and the Archival Project and Heritage Sunday.
- Renewing discovering a new identity. Examples are creation of Communication and Technology Committee and selection of a new Director of Adult Choirs.
- Rearranging making needed staff and leadership changes. Examples are rewrite of staff position descriptions and planning for staffing additions to meet anticipated church growth needs.
- Reconnecting reaffirming denominational connections. An example is GCC hosting the joint fall meeting of the Chicago Metropolitan and Fox Valley Associations in October.
- Recommitting commitment to new directions in ministry. This "R" has fueled the excellent work of the Senior Minister Search Committee.

Finally, I should point out that our leadership retreat last year brought to light a major issue that generated initiatives with which many here will be engaged in the coming months. As our Church Profile

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points out, from 2006 to 2011, our membership gradually declined by 17% and our average attendance at worship gradually declined 33%. One recent, plausible explanation for these declines, as stated in the profile, is that they reflect growing clergy-laity tension arising from a top-down clergy leadership style versus a bottom-up laity-leadership style. Whatever the cause or causes of them, I have learned in conversations with many infrequent attendee and non-active members, that their lost interest in the church would respond favorably to a retrieval and retention effort that involves us making direct contact with them and listening to the stories that generated their discontent with the church in an appreciative and unbiased way. I should add that I have also heard that many have chosen to reduce or withhold their pledges until they have the opportunity to assess preaching and leadership qualities of the new Senior Minister - an explanation which I feel is unjustified in light of the UCC recognizing that "God calls the whole church and every member to participate in and extend the ministry of Jesus Christ by witnessing to the Gospel in church and society." (Article VI, of the Constitution). This shared ministry at the root of what we embrace as congregationalism, which recognizes ordained ministers simply as those who are called to a specific form of ministry for which ecclesiastical authorization is required.

GCC and its great number of highly successful ministries attest to the fact that footing of this community of faith has been solidly built and even in this transitional period, remains so. And, I firmly believe, GCC will continue to be a vibrant community of faith, both fully expressing and living the gospel message for many years to come.

THE RAINBOW GARDEN!

As fall approaches and the temperatures begin to cool, the need to harvest suddenly explodes and we've been very busy in the Rainbow Garden. For several weeks now, our Sunday school gardeners have been harvesting primarily string beans (green, yellow, and especially yummy purple ones!), hot and sweet peppers, collards, and swiss chard. Our patty pan squash pretty much took over the small bed by the office entrance and have been very busy producing for us while the eggplant continues to explode for another bed of beautiful purple deliciousness. We continue to pick fresh herbs which are a delightful and much-loved treat to Northfield Food Pantry patrons. Recently we harvested some beautiful potatoes from our potato cages and we also pulled our first leek. We anticipate ongoing harvesting for several weeks to come so please stop by to see what else we're growing. If your garden at home is producing faster than you can eat, please consider donating your surplus to the Northfield Food Pantry. If you bring your produce on Sundays, we'd be happy to drop it off for you.

Many people have expressed concern or frustration that we had to remove a portion of the garden to accommodate the construction on the south lawn. We couldn't be happier! Jen Helgren and her team have been absolutely fantastic and my hat goes off to them. Jen agonized over having to call me and I think it was harder for her to deliver the news than it was for me to take it. She offered to try to wrangle some help but once I was able to lay out a plan, the Facility staff took over and within a few hours they had most of the work done themselves! This disruption in the garden

has truly been an asset for us and I hope you will see that as well. First, it's a great reminder to TOPP that GCC has been incredibly generous in the use of land and in all of the support that we have received for the garden and for our mission to provide organic produce to people in need in our community. Second, it's an opportunity to assess the condition of our wooden garden beds. We use untreated wood for most of our beds because it's a healthier option but that means they won't last as long as treated woods. With the beds lifted out, we can see they are showing significant signs of age after three seasons so we anticipate that we will need to begin replacing them after next year. Third, this was a great test in creative gardening. We were able to successfully transplant several of our veggies to new locations both within the Rainbow Garden and to other TOPP locations. Some of these veggies, like beets, are not generally transplant-tolerant but still made the move despite crazy heat and our ongoing drought. In fact, the zucchini we moved to my back yard had originally come from my own garden and are now better looking than the zucchini that spent the entire summer in one place!

We are thrilled to have the opportunity to continue to garden at GCC and we are incredibly grateful to Jen Helgren and the Properties Board for their ongoing support, Kathy Lifton for sharing her Sunday schoolers with us, and our wonderful waterers: Kevin Count, Cathy Shapiro, Laura Hill, and the Jablonski family. We couldn't have done any of this without you!
