## Pilgrim's Progress

The value of many of the biblical stories is how our stories intersect with those stories. As we explore these intersections, we may discover these stories to be valuable resources for our faith development and our spiritual growth. The story of Esau and Jacob is one of these insightful stories.

A rift erupted between the twins, Esau and Jacob, when Jacob received his father's blessing, a blessing intended for Esau. Esau was outraged and threatened to kill Jacob. Jacob left home, afraid for his life, and the brothers were estranged for twenty years. A lot happened in twenty years. Then the opportunity came for the brothers to meet face to face.

Jacob did everything he could think of to appease Esau, but all of it was wasted on Esau. As soon as Esau saw Jacob, he ran to him, threw his arms around him, and kissed him. This aspect about Esau is nearly lost by practically everyone who knows the story of Esau and Jacob. Jacob offered Esau many gifts. Esau brushed all of that aside by saying, "I have enough, my brother; keep what you have" (Gen. 33:9). Do you know anyone who ever said, "I have enough"? We are more like John D. Rockefeller. When asked how much money is enough, Rockefeller replied, "Just a little bit more." Jacob insisted and Esau finally agreed to accept the gifts. One impression given in the story is that accepting the gifts was the only way Jacob could have his guilt assuaged. Esau's warm, loving, forgiving acceptance of Jacob was difficult for Jacob to receive. Jacob seemed to have been at a loss, so vulnerable, so much at Esau's mercy.

Esau volunteered to travel with Jacob, but Jacob refused. He offered some of his men to travel with Jacob, but again he refused. How uncomfortable Jacob was with forgiveness and acceptance. How comfortable Esau was forgiving and accepting. Apparently, Esau had worked through his resentment and rage at Jacob. He was able, willing, and even eager to be in Jacob's

company. But it never happened. Even though this event of meeting and reconciliation occurred, Jacob and Esau were never really in a close relationship.

I wonder if there are similar experiences of estrangement in our relationships. If we have a relationship that is broken, what do we do to contribute to the broken relationship? What can we do to repair and rebuild the relationship? I wonder how the story of Esau and Jacob can help us.

## Special Congregational Meeting Report

A Special Congregational Meeting to consider whether to accept the recommendation of the Executive Board Personnel Task Force to vacate the position of Minister of Mission and Ministry was held as announced on September 27. Approximately 400 people attended the meeting. The recommendation was accepted by the GCC members by a vote of 194 in favor and 144 opposed. As required in the call letter agreement, 90 days notice has been given to Sally Iberg via a letter delivered to her on September 29. The Moderators and Senior Minister will be working with Sally during the next three months to finalize arrangements and will come to Executive Board for approval of those arrangements.

This was a difficult decision for our congregation and has profound implications for both our church and for Sally. Sally has served us well for the past 6 years and she has made significant contributions to the missions and ministry of our church. Sally has been an important resource for GCC members and their families and has been a representative for GCC to the Chicago Metropolitan Association as well as to the Illinois Conference of the UCC. Plans for celebrating Sally's ministry to GCC are being discussed currently and will be shared with the congregation once they are finalized. We offer our sincere thanks and our very best wishes to Sally.

## MUSIC NOTES

### Come Sunday

**"Lord, Dear Lord above: God Almighty; God of love. Please look down and see my people through."**

– Duke Ellington (from *Come Sunday*) –  
Our postlude from September 27.

Each Sunday through May, our preludes and postludes will be following themes in order to highlight the versatility of our Sanctuary organ. September was "Organ and..." other instruments. From flute to saxophone, classical to jazz, hopefully you got a taste of the variety of sonorities this instrument is capable of. October is Preludes, Fugues and Toccatas month.

The preludes and fugues of Dietrich Buxtehude (1637-1707), a German/Danish organist, represent the height of North German organ music in the 17th century. He employed techniques of Stylus Fantasticus, a very free method of composing, almost improvisatory in nature, which "showed off" the technique of the organist as well as the beauty of inner harmonies unbound to

text or melodic subjects. His music was the foundation for the early compositions of J.S. Bach.

J.S. Bach (1685-1750) reportedly walked 250 miles one way to learn from Buxtehude. His musical output was vast, and is considered to have been the height of maturity of the Baroque style with its intellectual, contrapuntal writing, its technical demands as well as its beauty. While Bach may have walked many miles to hear his mentor, his career took place in a small geographic location compared to many major composers.

Joseph Callaerts (1838-1901) may have beaten Bach in geographic limitation. He lived in Antwerp his entire life. A student of Nicolaus Jacques Lemmons (who composed the famous Fanfare played at weddings here at GCC), Callaerts received 1st prize at the Brussels Conservatory.

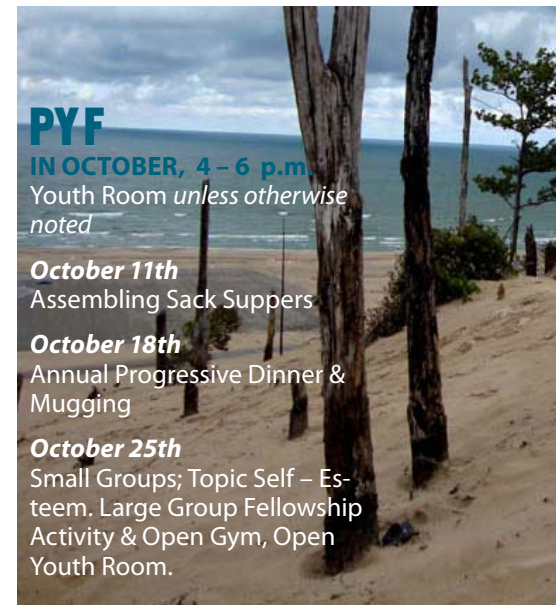
